Coursework Calculator

As required by the United States Department of Education, the Higher Learning Commission (HLC), and the Association of Theological Schools (ATS), SHSST expects students to spend two-three hours per week completing course assignments for every course credit hour. This standard does not include scheduled classroom instruction periods. Given the significant time demands placed upon the seminarian by the M.Div. degree's human, spiritual, and pastoral formation requirements that must be completed in addition to academic courses, SHSST instructors are strongly encouraged to construct academic courses that correspond to a weekly two-hours-per-credit-hour workload standard.

The amount of time actually spent on competing assignments will obviously depend upon the individual student's aptitudes and abilities. The setting of the two-hours-per-credit-hour standard does not represent a "cap" which allows the individual student to cease efforts on completing assignments. Rather, the purpose of the two-hours-per-credit-hour standard is to assist instructors with determining reasonable coursework expectations. Since SHSST semesters are 15 weeks in length, students are expected to dedicate the following amounts of time completing course assignments:

| | One Credit Courses | Two-Credit Courses | Three-Credit Courses |

| Weekly | Two hours | Four hours | Six hours |
| Semester | 30 hours | 60 hours | 90 hours |

The time dedicated to completing assignments will undoubtedly vary each week based upon the demands of a particular assignment, but instructors are to schedule coursework in a manner that avoids assigning an exorbitant amount in any one week or concentrated period.

The following workload calculator, which is based upon the norms in ATS institutions and surveys of SHSST students, is provided to instructors to assist in determining appropriate coursework expectations. This chart is to function only as a guide to the instructor, as each assignment will need to be calibrated based upon the particular expectations and requirements, as well as text font size, etc.

| Testing | Quiz | 1-2 hours of study | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students synthesize covered material (class notes, reading assignments, etc.) in take-home exams, so no additional preparation time is factored in their completion. |
