The Dignity of Gratitude – Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks

Last week's Thanksgiving holiday celebration may have lacked many things for many people, but it hopefully still held fast to the value of gratitude. One can be grateful for many small things or even for those things that are beyond one's reach.

It is possible to look upon the world with awe and wonder and appreciate certain people who rise above the average, using their intellect and their care for humanity to make the world a much better place for all. You may or may not be aware of one such person, Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks. Unfortunately, Rabbi Sacks died of cancer early in November at the age of 72.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks was someone who was admired far beyond the Jewish world. He lent his voice to discussions on faith, reason, religious liberty and interfaith dialogue. He was an internationally known philosopher, a prolific speaker and author. Cardinal Vincent Nichols of Westminster stated, "Chief Rabbi Sacks was a most eloquent proponent of some of the greatest truths of humanity, so often forgotten."

The vision of the Lux Center is "To strengthen the living relationship between the Jewish and the Catholic people." To do this, first we must invest ourselves in Rabbi Jonathan Sack's own words, "The test of faith is whether I can make space for difference. Can I recognize God's image in someone who is not in my image, whose language, faith, ideal, are different from mine? If I cannot, then I have made God in my image instead of allowing him to remake me in his."

I urge you to look up the writings and the books of Jonathan Sacks. You will not regret the time you spend doing this.
