



## Admission Process

Cor Unum is a distinctive pathway within the Master of Arts (M.A.). The program will adhere to the admissions process and requirements delineated in the M.A. Handbook. Enrollment will be limited to 15 students. The application process includes:

1. M.A. online application ([www.shsst.edu/cor-unum](http://www.shsst.edu/cor-unum)) and a non-refundable application fee of \$100.
2. Previously, the Miller Analogies Test (MAT) was required for anyone not having a master's degree. MAT testing is limited due to Covid-19. If the test is not available, students without a master's degree will be considered to have satisfied the MAT requirement by successfully completing their first semester.
3. Official transcripts from **all institutions of higher education attended, whether or not a degree was obtained.**
4. Resume listing employment history, educational background, specialized training, community involvements, publications (if applicable), talents/abilities, and other pertinent information.
5. An essay (500-1000 words) that addresses the following topics:
  - a. Why are you interested in the MA program at Sacred Heart?
  - b. How have your life experiences and education contributed to the pursuit of an MA degree?
  - c. What do you anticipate being able to accomplish with this MA program in the future?
6. Two letters of recommendation. One must be from a pastor or other similar person in a parish, diocese, religious community, or the equivalent.

Rolling admissions for Fall 2023 are already underway. All application materials must be submitted online or to:
