## CERTIFICATE IN PRIESTLY FORMATION

Sacred Heart offers a **Certificate in Priestly Formation** candidates whose sponsors may not wish them to pursue an undergraduate degree. The Certificate Program consists of the same four components as the Master of Divinity Program: human formation, spiritual formation, intellectual formation, and pastoral formation. Admission requirements are the same as for the Master of Divinity Program except for the requirement of an undergraduate degree. The certificate is conferred upon completion of all the required program components. To be eligible, the candidate must be at least 30 years old and have at least 60 undergraduate credits from accredited institutions.

## INDIVIDUALIZED ORDINATION TRACK

An individual program through the four dimensions of Priestly Formation is designed for candidates who enter the seminary as Permanent Deacons or have previous seminary formation. Plans are based on the prior coursework and life experience of the candidate in conversation with the sponsoring diocese.
